

Hanama`ulu is located approximately two miles east of Līhu`e and is one of seven ancient land divisions (ahupua`a) on the beautiful island of Kaua`i.

In 1877, Hanama'ulu Mill, the Līhu'e plantation's second mill, was built and soon became known as the best financed and most modern plantation in Hawai'i, putting Hanama'ulu on the map.

In the 1950s, the Līhu'e plantation phased out the old camps and opened housing subdivisions at Hanama'ulu, enabling plantation workers and their families to own their homes.

More than a collection of buildings, the pulse of Hanama'ulu is truly measured by its people. To remember the town's rich local history, the community is coming together for the annual Hanama'ulu Celebration. This two-day event features cultural music and dances, arts and crafts, displays, ethnic foods, games and competitive activities.
